Preface

IJIR Supplement Editor and SSI Meeting Co-Chair's Comments:

In 1994, the Society for the Study of Impotence, Inc. was formed with the purpose to promote, encourage and support the highest standards of practice, research, education and ethics in the study of human sexual function and dysfunction. For the first six years, this noble and worthwhile cause has been accomplished independent of commercial and industrial sources of financial support. Since its inception, the only sources of revenue for the Society for the Study of Impotence Inc. have been membership dues. Guided by this principle, the Society has successfully achieved its goal to provide an open forum for the free exchange and discussion of new ideas, thoughts and concepts in the field of sexual medicine. The last six sessions at the American Urological Association annual convention have been wonderful and excellent venues for the presentation of basic science and clinical research data on sexual dysfunction. During the specific hours of the meeting of the Society at the AUA, no other impotence sessions are scheduled and the last several meetings have attracted approximately 1000 individuals. The Society for the Study of Impotence, Inc., maintains an additional watchdog role in the field of sexual dysfunction. Through its active Health Policy Committee, the Society's important and unique role is to identify possibly dishonest, misleading or fraudulent advertising and mailing in the field of sexual medicine.

In 1998, the Executive Committee of the Society for the Study of Impotence, Inc., voted to accept unrestricted educational grants. This new policy change in the Society was achieved with lengthy and often emotional discussion. This procedural alteration will not affect the goals or principles of the Society in any manner. The Society will maintain its high standards and preserve its role as a forum for interchange of information in the field of sexual medicine. The acceptance of unrestricted educational grants will, however, allow our Society to grow.

The Society for the Study of Impotence, Inc. will hold, for the first time, an educational meeting for its members outside of the annual American Urological Association convention. This first meeting, to be held in Boston, October 1-3, 1999, will consist of an exceptional mix of scientific information, including six state of the art lectures, 32 original scientific papers and 61 poster presentations, combined with friendly social activities. A variety of topics relating to male and female sexual function and dysfunction will be highlighted. There will be four prize essay awards including clinical and research investigation in male and female sexual dysfunction. A total of 15 SSI members were dedicated to the abstract and prize essay review committee; a total of 32 SSI members will be moderators. Meeting participants will span the ages and practice habits of the SSI membership. The meeting venue will be the Boston University main campus 'on the Charles River' in the heart of downtown Boston.

In summary, this is an especially interesting moment in the dynamic history of the field of sexual medicine and of the Society for the Study of Impotence, Inc. As one of the chairs for the Boston meeting, it has been a privilege and a pleasure to work with all the members of our Society to maintain our leadership role in the practice, research, education and ethics in the study of human sexual function and dysfunction.

At this moment, I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the members of the SSI, especially the Executive and Development Committees, and in particular John Mulcahy, President of the SSI and Jamie Barada, Treasurer of the SSI for all their assistance, support, guidance and patience. With so many people cooperating and contributing to this new 'group' endeavor, this first Fall meeting of the SSI could be nothing else but a resounding educational success. Finally, I would like to acknowledge the man who is the heart and soul of the Society for the Study of Impotence, Inc. Ira Sharlip. During my last year as President and during this year as meeting co-chair, I have communicated with Ira on countless occasions. He was always available, cheerful, spirited, and full of intelligence, wit and good common sense. His dedication to the Society is remarkable. Ira, thank you for your energy and vision to a more involved, invigorated and rejuvenated role of the SSI in the field of human sexual function and dysfunction.

AFUD Executive Director's Comments:

The American Foundation for Urologic Disease (AFUD) has come to recognize, through the Sexual Function Health Council of the AFUD, the need for additional scientific investigation and public education in the field of male and female sexual dysfunction. From a research standpoint, the Foundation has been supporting sexual dysfunction studies through the American Foundation for Urologic Disease/American Urological Association research Scholars program. This program has helped train several of today's leading erectile dysfunction and female sexual dysfunction researchers. The first AFUD/AUA-sponsored male researcher in sexual dysfunction, Dr Harin Padma-Nathan and the first AFUD/AUA-sponsored female researcher in sexual dysfunction, Dr Jennifer Berman are both active members of the SSI.

The Sexual Function Health Council of the AFUD has been involved in major efforts to educate the public and help break down the barriers patients have towards discussing sexual dysfunction with their physicians.
