PCRS-UK National Primary Care Respiratory Conference

Delivering Quality Respiratory Care Today - Raising the Bar

7th-8th October 2011, Telford International Centre

What a fantastic conference! With 250 delegates attending, and a cutting-edge programme of plenary sessions, workshops and practical sessions, there was a real sense of occasion throughout the two days. From the initial excitement of the opening plenary session – with keynote presentations by Iain Small, Robert Winter, Carol Stonham and Mike Thomas – through to the final session in which Karen Pickering MBE spoke about her life as an Olympic swimmer with asthma, this was a superb showcase for UK primary care respiratory medicine and for the PCRS-UK. The venue was excellent, old friendships were renewed, new friendships struck, the exhibition stands were visited, and we all learnt something as well. We were all truly able to go back to our practices and 'raise the bar'...

There was an excellent balance of sessions. The oral research presentations were the best attended research sessions we've had in several years, and almost all delegates reported that the balance between plenary sessions and workshop forums was absolutely right. Two main plenary sessions focused on asthma and its phenotypes, and comorbidities in COPD. The workshop forums were very well attended, with sessions on managing acute asthma, oxygen therapy, telehealth, anxiety and depression in respiratory disease, quality assessment and teamwork, COPD templates, bronchiectasis, flying and diving, vaccines for pneumonia, NIV, and new gadgets for primary care... There were also teaching sessions on how to prepare a poster for an academic meeting, and how to write a research paper and get it published. The speakers were excellent, the topics of great interest, and the dinner on Friday night (and the disco afterwards...) a great success.

One of the features of this year's conference was the presence of Graham Ogilvie, a cartoonist whose cartoons were on display throughout the conference. The Conference Committee have selected nine cartoons to be displayed on the PCRS-UK website and these will be mailed out to PCRS-UK members.

Webcasts have also been made of each of the plenary sessions, and once speakers have approved their webcast they will be included on the website as a resource and again distributed via e-mail to PCRS-UK members.

The overall feedback (as in previous years) was extremely positive, with most sessions being rated as 'excellent' or 'good'. The Grand Round on Saturday morning – with four case histories on interstitial lung disease, lung cancer, food allergy and asthma, and the respiratory complications of illegal drug usage – was the most highly rated session with 75% of delegates rating it as excellent.

It is only appropriate to proffer our congratulations and heartfelt

thanks to Sam Walker who has chaired the PCRS-UK Conference Organising Committee for a number of years. We are enormously grateful to her for her hard work and dedication. We congratulate Sandy Walmsley and Andy Whittamore who are taking over as co-chairs of the Committee, and we wish them every success.

Next year's conference will, of course, be the IPCRG 6th World conference which the PCRS-UK is hosting in Edinburgh from 25th to 28th April 2012. If you haven't registered yet, then do so! This is the key primary care respiratory conference in the world, and it's on your doorstep. We look forward to seeing you there!

PCRS-UK Research

Respiratory disease carries a high burden of symptoms and mortality. Many people with respiratory disease are undertreated and live constantly with their symptoms and disability. In comparison with other chronic diseases, research into respiratory disease has been, and continues to be, underfunded; research on lung cancer, for example, is grossly underfunded compared to other forms of cancer. Much of current research funding goes to the basic sciences, and health service research (the impact of disease on patients and how existing treatments are used) lags behind. These issues continue to be addressed by UK researchers and funders, primarily through the UK Respiratory Research Collaborative (UKRRC), of which the PCRS-UK is a member.

PCRS-UK research strategy & aims

The research strategy of the PCRS-UK is to work with researchers and clinicians to bring together their combined experience and aspirations to:

- Decide what are the important research questions relevant to primary care
- Turn the right research questions into funded projects (collaborative bids)
- Promote recruitment to funded studies
- Support the training and development of researchers
- Dissemination of findings to change practice

PCRS-UK is not a research sponsor, and any research is funded through provision of grants conducted through universities or other institutions.

How we intend to achieve our aims

1. Communication and collaboration

The key to better research is communication and collaboration. Through the UKRRC, the PCRS-UK meets with key stakeholders – leading academics, funding bodies such as the Medical Research Council (MRC), the Wellcome Trust and the National Institute for Health Research (NIHR), and charities such as Asthma UK and BLF – to discuss these issues and to facilitate research funding.

In addition, we hold an annual PCRS-UK Research Forum meeting for established research units and independent researchers. We discuss current and future research activity, including research agendas, priorities

and collaborative working. If you are interested in joining this forum please contact info@pcrs-uk.org.

Finally, we use the website and e-alerts to link clinicians and researchers within the PCRS-UK membership to promote and foster development of new researchers and encourage research in primary care, including:

- starting projects
 - collaborating with established teams
 - getting help and advice
 - providing news to the membership on research issues.
2. **Dissemination of research findings**
 - *Primary Care Respiratory Journal*
 - Poster and oral presentations at the PCRS-UK national conference
 - PCRS-UK educational activities including opinion sheets and summary publications.
 3. **Conducting new research and audits**
 - Small projects performed by PCRS members endorsed by PCRS-UK – e.g. the Delphi project on coding of COPD funded by the DOH.
 4. **Recruiting sites for research projects**
 - The PCRS-UK membership database can be used to target relevant primary care members to receive invitations to take part in studies.

5. Collaboration with IPCRG

The PCRS-UK collaborates with the International Primary Care Respiratory Group (IPCRG) on research in the following areas:

- Research needs: The PCRS-UK supports the IPCRG Research Needs statement which was published last year as a *PCRJ* supplement (*Prim Care Respir J* 2010;19(Suppl 1):S1-20. <http://dx.doi.org/10.4104/pcrj.2010.00081>)
- UK Respiratory Research Foundation (www.theipcr.org/ukrrf). This is a charity owned by the IPCRG which provides funding for respiratory research and is a member of the Association of Medical Research Charities. UKRRF has formal mechanisms for funding and approving research including a peer review process. PCRS-UK will seek funding for any projects it wishes to support through the UKRRF.

We are delighted to report that the FRESH AIR Survey Uganda has now been launched, funded by the IPCRG, and supported by a grant from Mundipharma International Ltd. It is a population-based, cross-sectional epidemiological study on the prevalence of COPD and its risk factors in resource-poor settings of a rural area in Uganda among 300 men and 300 women above the age of 30 years. IPCRG-Wonca Europe: agreement of collaboration 2011-2014

IPCRG's collaboration with family physicians' societies continues to grow. ERS General Practice and Primary Care Group 1.6

PCRJ Award for the best quality abstract submitted to the General Practice and Primary Care Group (category 1.6) of the ERS



At the European Respiratory Society meeting held in Amsterdam in September, the high quality of research in primary care was recognised formally for the first time. This year, authors of abstracts submitted to the General Practice and Primary Care Group (category 1.6) were competing for the *Primary Care Respiratory Journal (PCRJ)* Best Abstract Award, worth €500.

There were over 100 primary care abstracts selected for the ERS Congress held in Amsterdam from 24th – 28th September. These were narrowed down to a shortlist of five – two from the UK and one each from Sweden, Spain and Russia – by a Committee led by Associate Professor Niels Chavannes (Group Chair) and Associate Professor Bjorn Stallberg (Secretary). From these five, the *PCRJ* Editors selected the winner.

The *PCRJ* Award was won by Dr Shamil Haroon from the Department of Public Health, Sandwell Primary Care Trust, West Bromwich, Birmingham, together with his co-authors Rachel Jordan, Peymane Adeb and Carl Griffin. Their study, entitled “COPD case finding in primary care: a pilot study in the West Midlands, UK”, compared the effectiveness of targeted versus opportunistic case-finding strategies for COPD using a randomised trial design and a symptom questionnaire.

Meeting of the ERS Primary Care Group 1.6, Sunday 25th September 2011

The Primary Care Group meeting was held at 17.00 on Sunday afternoon at the ERS congress. Many thanks to all those who attended.

We had very useful discussions regarding symposia proposals for the 2013 ERS meeting. We all agreed that this year’s Primary Care Day – held the day before on Saturday 24th September – had been a great success. For the 2012 meeting in Vienna, we are proposing a shorter Primary Care Day to take place just in the afternoon on the Saturday of the conference.

This year, the number of submitted abstracts to the Primary Care Group (category 1.6) was slightly above 100, with a very high acceptance rate of 82%.

Hilary Pinnock has agreed to be a candidate for the post of Group Secretary, and will take up her position as from next year in Vienna.

Finally, we agreed that telemonitoring should be recommended as the subject for a new ERS Task Force.
